



The Spanish program imparts in students the skills, knowledge and qualities necessary to communicate and interact in Spanish-speaking cultures and communities around the world.

Courses range in level and topic from language and grammar to literature and film, and the major can be tailored to the cultural and career interests of the student. All entering freshmen must receive a language placement for languages with which they have prior experience to determine their beginning course level for that language.

Major Requirements

Students must take six advanced (300-level or above) classes, three of which must be at the 400-level.

In addition, students must complete a capstone project in consultation with their major advisor. Capstone experiences may include a special research project associated with a 400-level course or Independent Study, a follow-up presentation on a language intensive internship, or a pre-approved special project associated with a semester-length study abroad experience.

The major includes a semester-long study abroad experience in a Spanish-speaking country. Currently, we have agreements with programs in Ecuador (Quito), Costa Rica (Heredia and San Ramón), Spain (Burgos, Pamplona, Sevilla, and Valencia), and Uruguay (Montevideo).

Minor Requirements

To graduate with a Spanish minor, students need to complete the sequence of language courses (Beginner I, Beginner II, Intermediate I, Intermediate II, Advanced I, and Advanced II) and take one additional course at the 400-level.

Students who begin at the Intermediate II-level need to complete the sequence of language courses (Intermediate II, Advanced I, and Advanced II), and take two additional 400-level courses.
